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Congrats on Your Career Dean!

Often credited as the man that brought the Internet to Virginia State University (VSU), Dr. Emmanuel Omojokun's accomplishments since then and in his 37 year tenure in the Reginald F. Lewis College of Business includes the recent launch of a M.B.A. Program, recognition of the College by a national publication as the best business school in the nation at an HBCU and an enrollment boom that has grown in five years from 535 to more than 900 students in the Reginald F. Lewis College of Business.

Dr. Emmanuel Omojokun announced that after nearly four decades at VSU that he will retire as Dean of the Reginald F. Lewis College of Business effective July 1, 2026. Affectionately referred to as Dr. O by students and faculty/staff alike, he will after 12 years as Dean retire to spend more time with his wife and children and grandchildren.

From when in the 1990s he disrupted campus with the big dig even temporarily halting telephone service to lay the underground infrastructure for the Internet at VSU, it was obvious to everyone that Dr. O was a transformative leader intent on bringing big change to this institution of higher learning. Since then, Dr. Omojokun has held countless leadership positions often among a select group of persons to make hiring recommendations for Provosts, Deans, Vice Presidents, etc. He has personally secured more than \$25 million in research grants and published many journal articles. Dr. O's credits include launching a cyber security program, a Center for Entrepreneurship, a Student Success Fund, and supporting initiatives that would earn national, regional and local accolades. In his tenure at VSU, the now College of Business was recognized by the Governor multiple times including for transformative leadership.

Dr. Omojokun has been profiled on NBC and Fox for his College's accomplishments, served multiple times as an accreditor as it relates to reaccreditation of other business schools around the country, and taught and mentored countless students, faculty and staff. Perhaps what is less known is that he was invited multiple times by other institutions of higher learning to assume leadership in other places but because of his love for VSU always respectfully declined, and that he was known to personally contribute to student, faculty and staff causes and needs. Beyond VSU, it should be noted that the College of Business is widely recognized by VSU alumni, higher ed, K-12 school districts, industry, etc. as a flagship College of Business in the Commonwealth of Virginia. From hosting 250 companies a month in the classroom to lead experiential learning exercises to earning successive reaccreditation from the prestigious AACSB to graduating young professionals that at least partly because of Singleton Hall are afforded the opportunity to chase their dreams, the College of Business under Dr. Emmanuel Omojokun's leadership and his tenure has accrued a reputation as among the best of the best. It's perhaps why everyone from the sitting Governor to a sitting U.S. Senator to a sitting Congresswoman to scores of CEOs to entrepreneurs, etc. have visited Singleton Hall to see firsthand what has materialized because of Dr. Omojokun and his leadership.


He was recognized by the VSU Board of Visitors after serving multiple years on the Board representing faculty. The Board issued a resolution to be maintained permanently in the archives for his experience, wisdom and leadership qualities. At home, he is a great husband and father of five children with three M.D.s, one Ph.D. in Computer Science and another computer scientist along with 9 grandchildren.

All of the preceding is to say that the Reginald F. Lewis College of Business will sorely miss Dr. O upon retirement next summer as will the countless persons at VSU that have been positively impacted by this gentle giant. Congrats to Dr. Emmanuel Omojokun on retirement after 37 years at VSU!



BDO: Accounting students visited with accounting professionals at BDO's corporate offices.


Woo Woos: As always, the College is well represented on the University's cheer team.

Experiential Learning

The Chinese philosopher Confucius approximately 2,500 years ago said I hear and I forget, I see and I remember, I experience and I understand. That truism is as real today as it was two millennia ago. In the Reginald F. Lewis College of Business, experience in learning or “experiential” learning is the cornerstone of the College’s small group role-play with industry curriculum. Facilitated by industry, in a semester 250 companies lead undergrads in hands-on exercises pertinent to sales, cold calls, conflict resolution, customer is always right, branding, memos and reports, etc. Born out of an industry focus group now 15 years ago, the objectives regard refining soft skills, augmenting career awareness and developing real world skills not often learned in a traditional classroom. In a semester over 200 students participate in what constitutes an opportunity to build a robust portfolio of industry connections. Students at the end of the semester celebrate all of the practical skills that they developed in 15 weeks though the undergrads are not the sole learners. Instead, a recurring theme regards the industry representatives sharing that they learned as much from the students as the students from industry. Often described as the most rewarding experience in the week, the now thousands of industry representatives are imploring other institutions of higher learning to emulate Virginia State University.
