

Become a master of public service leadership.

This concentration enriches the knowledge, leadership skill, and marketability of public service professionals. Each course is tailored to promote and enhance an understanding of the complex socio-cultural, organizational, and political environments and shifts that affect community relations and public service work. Through this concentration, public service professionals will master: the theories and praxis of public service work; the critical and analytic awareness of power in relation to public/human, social, and emergency services, politics and government, education, and policing; and enhance leadership and management expertise through the development of interpersonal insight, empathic modeling, and cultural actualization.

Social Justice & Human Rights Practice

Master social justice and human rights practice.

This concentration has been uniquely developed to prepare and enhance human rights practitioners' and public service leaders' abilities to utilize theories of social justice and critical research methodologies to analyze and address complex social issues, and develop and implement policies related to social justice and human rights issues that arise in public service, governmental/political, community-based, non-profit, public policy, public health, legal/justice, corporate JEDI, and social work agencies.
